Birds Rescued at Leiterman Park in Milton

Our Animal Protective Services team (with help from our Registered Veterinary Technicians and Hobbitstee Wildlife Refuge), recently spent several days rescuing approximately five ducks and 10 geese from an oil spill at Leiterman Park in Milton.

We are thrilled to report all the birds who were in distress at the park have been successfully rescued and safely transported to the rehabilitation centre. All of them have been gently cleaned, assessed and will eventually be released back into the wild. The Ministry of the Environment is currently investigating the source of the spill.

No Pet Left Behind

Pets are often a huge concern for people experiencing personal crisis. OMHS began a Violence Prevention Program in 2002 to help victims of domestic violence by caring for their pets on a short-term basis. Due to increased needs in our community, the program expanded into the Families in Transition (FIT) program.

We are pleased to announce that the Halton Region Community Investment Fund has provided OMHS with a \$30,000 grant enabling us to continue providing the FIT program for another year.

FIT helps residents like
James (pictured with his
dogs Tyson and Jewels),
who find themselves
temporarily homeless for a
variety of reasons and can't
care for their pets. This could



be due to financial crisis, mental or physical health issues or being hospitalized. The FIT program provides temporary boarding, medical care, food and support for vulnerable pets – ensuring the family unit can be kept together.

The program is made possible thanks to our funders: the Regional Municipality of Halton, the Oakville Community Foundation's Give Oakville Campaign and the OMHS.

Caitlin Jones and APS: Protecting Animals 24/7

The role of Animal Protective Services (APS) Officers at the Oakville & Milton Humane Society (OMHS) goes far beyond just picking up strays. In fact, they are contracted by the Town of Oakville to fulfill animal control services, including providing enforcement for animal-related bylaws as well as the Dog Owners' Liability Act. They also respond 24/7 to calls for stray domestic animals in Oakville as well as conduct animal rescues for sick and injured wildlife in both Oakville and Milton.



Caitlin Jones has worked at OMHS for 11 years, the last three managing

APS, and knows better than anyone how challenging and rewarding the work can be. During that time she has helped more types of animals in distress than she can recall, but counts the rescue of a peregrine falcon as a career highlight.

"Each day is different as we respond to calls on an emergency basis. It typically includes several rescues and stray pick up calls. At the same time we carry out proactive patrols throughout neighbourhoods in Oakville as well as responding to concerns for investigations under the bylaw," explains Caitlin. Read more




Harnesses on Sale
